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**An Incomplete Revolution**

Every July, America celebrates our Declaration of Independence from the rule of British kings and queens. That document contains these famous words: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."


Those words are an ethical foundation for government, one that draws authority from the divine. But men, and it was men who wrote it, seem to perceive ethics differently from women. To over-generalize, men tend to think in terms of autonomy, rights, and justice, while women tend to think in terms of relationship, care, and responsibility.

In the beginning, it was a small circle of white men for whom autonomy, rights, and justice were available in law and custom. Over time, and at great cost, many have fought to have women, people of color, and others included in that circle. This is a great and good thing, and that struggle is obviously not over. The circle seems to expand and contract, and its boundaries are blurry. Law and custom are still not equally applied to all. Progress is slowly being made. But the conversation and the struggle still seem to ignore the other ethical dimension—that of relationship, care, and responsibility.

In 1852, Frederick Douglass gave a speech titled, *What to the Slave Is the Fourth of July?* in which he says that all the patriotic talk about liberty, citizenship, and freedom, are an offense to the enslaved people of the United States because of their lack of freedom, liberty, and citizenship. He was talking about rights—and he was also talking about

care. Just as the state must apply the ethical dimension of rights and justice to all, so must it extend the other ethical dimension of relationships and care to all. The integration of these two dimensions is the basis of a complete ethics of government, and the mark of good government.

Because Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness are not just dependent on rights and justice—they also depend on good relationships, on care for all, and on responsible government and responsible people.
