On Thursday March 28th at SOMOS, 10:30 a.m. to noon, the group will discuss David Grann's 2017 nonfiction *Killers of the Flower Moon — The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI.* This "reign of terror" on the Osage tribal people happened 100 years ago in Oklahoma, and in the words of contemporary tribal member Mary Jo Webb, "This land is saturated with blood." Grann unravels and "illuminates a sickening conspiracy that goes far deeper than those four years of horror." (See Dave Eggers NYT review April 2017.) Tribal member and member of our congregation, Julian Spalding, will deliver the March 31 Fifth Sunday Program on this topic.
