Right Now, It's Like This Rev. Diana Davies

In a coincidence that might be viewed as a divine, cruel joke or as mystically meaningful irony, both Inauguration Day and MLK Day will fall on January 20 this year. Dr. Bernice King, Rev. King's daughter, has said that she is "glad" for this collision of events, as it will only serve to highlight the difference between her father's message of love and justice, and the message of hatred and fear embraced by the president-elect and his most ardent followers.

In a recent sermon, I referred to Brother David Steindl-Rast's teaching that, while we may not be grateful for the terrible things that happen in life, we can be grateful for the opportunity that each new moment presents us. January 20th will be a date to put this lesson into practice. We are presented with the opportunity to find greater meaning in MLK Day than ever before.

For those of us who have had the luxury of thinking of MLK Day as a day off from work or a day to feel good about ourselves and how far we've come, listening to platitudes about nonviolence or dreams of peaceful equality, that other event that will take place this January 20th transforms a "nice" holiday into an urgent call to action.

Sixteen years ago, witnessing the inauguration of the first Black president in our country's history, it was easy for some of us to believe that we were living in a "post-racial" reality, and that racism was just a relic of the past. But this January 20th, the falsehood of that belief will be blatantly evident. This year's MLK Day presents us with the opportunity to take seriously the urgent need for equity and justice and to commit ourselves, fully and courageously, to this work.

SHARING CIRCLES

Networks of Grace or UU Covenant Groups January 12, 11 a.m.

The January sharing circle topic is *Networks of Grace or UU Covenant Groups*. There is no better antidote to hopelessness or despair than community.

According to Michael Meade, since the world tensions that divide us may intensify, we need to make moments of wholeness that remind us of the underlying unity of life. We need to feel that, despite all the current divisions and heartbreaking conflicts, grace can fall upon us at any time.

In *The Hope: A Guide to Sacred Activism,* Andrew Harvey recommends forming "Networks of Grace," groups composed of 6 to 12 individuals who meet to find solidarity and mutual support during a time of intense change.

This is similar to "covenant groups" (small, closed groups that meet on a regular basis over several months) that exist in many UU congregations. To create the support we need, forming covenant groups based in healthy communication, deep trust, and a commitment to hearing ALL voices, may be one way to answer Rev. Diana's question: "What gift of opportunity is life offering you at this moment?"


