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Right Now, It's Like This Rev. Diana Davies

One of my favorite parts of ministry is officiating life-cycle ceremonies, including weddings, memorial services, and child dedications. But perhaps the most moving ritual I've ever participated in was a Renaming Ceremony for a transgender member of my congregation. At one point during the ceremony, the beloved person, attired in the truest expression of her identity, stood in front of a mirror that was covered by a cloth. Her friends and chosen family stood all around her. When the cover was removed from the mirror, the person saw herself as she had always known herself to be, but visibly surrounded by expressions of love, care, and acceptance. Everything about that moment was RIGHT, and I experienced the presence of divine Love in that room.

Today, the well-being of that beloved person is under attack. Many trans, non-binary, and intersex individuals and their families are living in fear of losing their rights and even their lives. As Unitarian Universalists who affirm the inherent worth and dignity of every person and who believe that every person has the right to live authentically and to flourish, we are called to support our trans siblings.

I know that for some of us this can feel like a stretch. Not because we aren't progressive and caring, but just because we were raised to believe that there are only two genders, and that gender is directly tied to sexual anatomy. To learn, now, that the truth is much more complicated can be deeply disorienting. That's why we need to proceed in this work with care and with kindness. But proceed we must, because lives are at stake.

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Béla Bartók (1881-1945) was an extraordinary Hungarian composer who creatively used folk music to interweave tonal and atonal writing in chamber works and large orchestral pieces. Saturday February 8th, Chatter North (Santa Fe) played Bartók's 1939 piece for small string orchestra to the acclaim of a packed audience, including a friend and me. While there is nothing like live performance, this is a fine recording of Bartók's Divertimento for string orchestra, by Glenn Gould School musicians in Toronto, 2022 (25 minutes).

The Taos School of Music faculty and students play Bartók's six string quartets every summer. More on Bartók's work and life <u>here</u>.
