Right Now, It's Like This Rev. Diana Davies

"Once upon a time there were no flowers at all... Wherever one might have looked, from the poles to the equator, one would have seen only the cold dark monotonous green of a world whose plant life possessed no other color. Somewhere, just a short time before the close of the Age of Reptiles, there occurred a soundless, violent explosion... It marked the emergence of the ... flowering plants." — Loren Eiseley (1957)

First of all, thank you to the mysterious person who left a lovely bouquet of colorful flowers by my front door.

And, speaking of flowers...

It's spring, which means that Unitarian Universalists in congregations all over the world will be celebrating one of our most beloved religious ceremonies, the Flower Ceremony. In 1923, Czechoslovakia was a new democracy and the Unitarian church in Prague was thriving. When that congregation's minister, Rev. Norbert Capek, was looking for a Unitarian alternative to the Christian communion of bread and wine, he chose flowers as the things that would best represent the spirit of communion, of community. Flowers, because they are all around us, so common that they are easy to overlook, and yet each one a miracle. Flowers, because of their amazing diversity - each kind with its own distinct color, shape and fragrance. Each one might be incredibly fragile, but as a group, they feed and color the whole world.

One hundred and two years after the first Flower Ceremony, we are living in a time when some folks seem to have forgotten the importance of diversity. Some are actively opposed to it — the White Christian Nationalists and others who want to stamp out difference and enforce a racial, cultural, sexual, linguistic, and religious conformity.

This month, as we gather flowers together, in our glorious diversity, we stand up against the forces of conformity; we resist a philosophy that would place commerce above human lives, and some human lives

above others. The rainbow of difference, illuminated by a universal and courageous love, can change the world. It already has. And it will again.

Flower Ceremony Rev. Diana Davies Sunday, May 4, 11 a.m.

The first Flower Ceremony was held in Prague, Czechoslovakia, in June 1923, led by Rev. Norbert Čapek. For over 100 years, this beloved tradition and its powerful history have provided meaning to UU congregations around the world. In this ceremony, everyone in the congregation brings a flower. Each person places a flower in a shared vase. The congregation and minister bless the flowers, and they're redistributed. Please join us for this joyous celebration of diverse community.
