Just as joy can be an act of resistance, celebration can be an act of re-membering, of joining together to remember why we fight for the things that matter. And in June, we celebrate. On the first Sunday, we'll celebrate Pride month, and we'll also remember the values of our Universalist ancestors, who were, in many ways, the original "Love People," preaching a message of universal salvation and love, regardless of faith or identity. Then, on June 15, we'll celebrate 20 years of the Unitarian Congregation of Taos! Please come and be sure to invite anyone who's ever had a connection to our congregation, even if they've been away for a while.

As much as we celebrate the past, the only way to truly honor it is to continue moving into the future. And that's what Unitarian Universalists are doing, here in Taos and around our country. I especially want to draw your attention to something that's been unfolding up in Vermont, where a Columbia student named Mohsen Mahdawi was aided by members of the UU congregation that had come to see him as a part of their beloved community. 

In June, we will read *The Best Minds—A Story of Friendship, Madness, and the Tragedy of Good Intentions,* by Jonathan Rosen.



The Best Minds, a Pulitzer Prize finalist, was named a Top 10 Best Book of 2023 by *The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal, The Atlantic,* and *People,* and was named one of Barack Obama's favorite books of 2023. In it, acclaimed author Jonathan Rosen relates his riveting investigation of the forces at play that led his closest childhood friend Michael from the heights of brilliant promise to debilitating mental illness.

Michael blazed through college in three years, graduating summa cum laude and landing a topflight consulting job. But all was not as it seemed. One day, Jonathan received the call: Michael had suffered a serious psychotic break and was in the locked ward of a psychiatric hospital, diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia. Michael was still battling delusions when he traded his halfway house for Yale Law School. Featured in *The New York Times* as a role-model genius, he sold a memoir with film rights to Ron Howard. But then, in the grip of an unshakeable paranoid fantasy, Michael stabbed his girlfriend Carrie to death and became a front-page story of an entirely different sort.

This is a story about friendship, love, and the price of self-delusion. *The Best Minds* explores the ways in which we understand — and fail to understand — mental illness.
